Dear Parents

I think we may all have got a little overexcited with the hot sunny weather at the start of term, easily done after such a long winter but reality has now set in. Please remember that winter or summer uniform can still be worn and our priority is for the children to be warm and comfortable. Always wishing to look for the positives, the rain does help to ensure the Edge Grove grounds are verdant and rich in wildlife. Eco-Day last week was the perfect opportunity for pupils to consider the impact we all have on the environment, especially with our reliance on plastics and other harmful materials together with learning about what positive action we can all take. It was wonderful to see the grounds alive with children exploring the eco-systems, investigating the benefits of various plants and even sowing wildlife attracting seeds with Mrs Dawson in Forest School. Our greenhouses are now full with recycled plant pots and germinating seeds which will fill our school garden and may also be available to buy at the summer fete - fingers crossed! The Lower School pupils also did their bit and learnt that every little helps by picking dandelion flowers in The Park before they go to seed to avoid us having to use harmful herbicides. awareness and a deep rooted understanding of ecology is very much a way of life at Edge Grove.

Table tennis continues to be a very popular pastime at the school and for the third consecutive year, it was a great pleasure to host the U11 and U13 IAPS National Championships with 130 competitors from 22 different schools across the country. Quite a feat of logistics with 9 tables in operation all day but this caused few problems for Mr Craxton and his mathematical brain. Together with Mr McManus and exacting organisational skills, the day ran extremely smoothly with many positive comments from visiting parents and coaches. My thanks to those parents and staff who helped throughout the day and many congratulations to pupils who participated - always with great determination and skill. Our pupils, once again, demonstrated excellent behaviour and in stark contrast to another of the attending schools. I am delighted to announce that Ishaan (year 8) came third in the U13 competition as did Darcey (year 6) in the U11 category - well done!

Every day, from around 8.00am onwards, we are tempted and slightly tortured by the delicious aromas that come from our school kitchens. I am constantly amazed by the quality, variety and consistency of food which is produced daily. However, I am well aware that traditionally, food in schools comes under fire which in recent years is mostly unjustified. Whilst we have a great deal of variety with homemade soup and bread, full salad bar, two main options and a vegetarian alternative plus a range of hot and cold puddings, it is not possible for each child to choose their own daily menu. And therein lies the problem. Our menus are nutritionally balanced, with steamed vegetables, varied sources of carbohydrates, proteins and vitamins, all in place to ensure that our pupils understand the importance of a healthy diet and to encourage good eating habits that will stay with them for life. However, as with instilling kindness and social skills, we do need your help too. Please review our three-weekly menus (changed termly and according to the seasons) which can be found on Firefly and discuss choices with your children, especially those who may be a little fussy or keen to avoid vegetables. We also ask that you encourage them to try different foods at home; to be adventurous and to be risk takers with their eating! We are always happy to host small groups of parents for lunch so you can see for yourselves the high quality of our food. In the past this has elicited comments such as, 'the broccoli is actually green' and 'I had no idea there

was so much choice - my son often tells me there is nothing to eat!'

Dylan, Lucas, Nicolas and Vihaan competed for Edge Grove on Tuesday afternoon at the prestigious annual Aldwickbury Maths Challenge, involving 30 schools which meant 60 pairs competing. Douglas Buchanan was, as always, the quiz master and the event kicked off with a game of "Dicey Dicey" which involves quick mental arithmetic.

"What is next?" came next, which not surprisingly, was selecting the correct next number in a sequence. Try this one - 23,18,11,2, ? or this one D, G, J, M, ? Then Make 24; an Edge Grove Year 4 favourite but here the numbers were up to and including 10 and making 24 really was a challenge - so Mrs Thomas thought! Using a code, sudoku and tangrams featured in the next round which for those who love maths provided a delightful feast. An hour and a half later the top three results were announced. Edge Grove, we found out after, came 6th out of 32 teams which was fabulous news.

This challenge afternoon stretched young minds, encouraged perseverance, rewarded effort and was great fun. In June, Edge Grove will be aiming to encourage all of the above by hosting a slightly lower key but nonetheless challenging maths morning for year 3 pupils from a range of local schools.


Flourish Parent Workshop Developing the 'Inner Coach'

Encouraging children to recognise they have the ability to take control of their thoughts, feelings and actions can be transformational – supporting them to do this by developing their 'inner coach' is a valuable life skill.

Recognition that the focus and frequency of thoughts shifts perceptions is key. The 'inner coach' focusses on the positive, it observes, evaluates and thinks through options and positive solutions rather than catastrophizing and self-blaming. With practice the inner coach becomes stronger, the preferred thought pattern, allowing children to cope better with challenges and maintain a 'can do' approach to life. This activity based workshop explores:

- 'Inner mind chatter' - how we talk to ourselves and the effect
- Recognising how thought patterns influence feelings and behaviour
- Developing evaluation skills
- Taking ownership of 'mindset'
- How to set and achieve goals

Well done to all involved.


