Year 1 had a wonderful time on safari at the Paradise Wildlife Park. Workshops focused on different habitats around the world, how animals adapt and evolve to life in these habitats and the impact that humans have on the environment. Our school Rainforests topic has also touched on these issues and it was a good opportunity for the children to speak to people working in the field of animal conservation to understand the real life effect of issues such as deforestation. Back at school, Reception went on a 3D shape hunt and discovered that cylinders were the most common shape on our site – there are certainly lots of tree trunks to be found (lucky us!). Pre-School were also working in 3D, making wonderful paper sculptures including turtles, which required lots of problem solving and creativity to make the dome shape of the shell just right. Year 2 took some time out of their busy rehearsal schedule to create some beautiful sketches inspired by the rose garden.

Year 3

An eventful week with a bout of mixed weather but that didn't stop year 3 from fully engaging in another action packed week of fun learning. In English children gathered all the skills that they had learnt over the last few weeks in a final attempt to write a persuasive letter to the Prime Minister about the importance of the RNLI (ask the children what this stands for). Maths was very popular as children looked into real life examples of handling money and working out change. They were also visited by a special company which gave a taster for magical maths (ask your children about it). Topic continued to explore the Mayan civilisation and the importance of masks in the culture; what they symbolise and why specifically they were worn. In science, year 3 incorporated internet research skills to find out about the 7 key animal classifications - beautiful posters were designed to show features of each group and have formed part of a factual classroom display. The children are very much looking forward to Expedition Week and it has been a popular topic for discussion during form times.



Year 4

The main event in year 4 this week most definitely happened on Tuesday when Mr Junkman presented the Junk Orchestra workshop. The children were very enthusiastic during his demonstrations, whilst creating and performing with their own musical instruments out of the materials that they had brought in and finally when performing with Mr Junkman at the end of the day. The workshops complimented our science and topic learning this half term, the children could appreciate what affected the pitch and amplitude of their sounds. In English we read and analysed extracts from the Butterfly Lion and introduced The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe which is a text that the Year 5 teachers would like the children to read during the holidays. To that end we have placed a link on Firefly to an audio version of the story in the year 4 English section.



Middle School News

In French, year 5 have been learning to talk about places in town and where we go during the weekend. We have used interactive games and role-plays to consolidate the new vocabulary and we have mastered the conjugation of the verb 'aller' in the present tense! In year 6 we have enjoyed talking about meals and we have learnt new vocabulary linked to food. It has been very interesting finding out about the variety of crêpes that French people eat as a snack!

In RS the year 5 pupils have enjoyed sharing their presentations on the 'Big Philosophy' questions we started investigating last week. These have ranged from 'What is the meaning of life' to 'Should governments penalise people for unhealthy lifestyles?' The quality of the presentations were truly outstanding as the children presented their ideas with pride and confidence for discussion with the rest of the class. In year 6, the children continued their exploration of Buddhism. They researched the Buddhist symbols and their meanings, resulting in some wonderful collages in Google drawings.

In music, the middle school pupils have been working well this week taking their knowledge of both African Drumming and Samba and using this to compose their own pieces of music in the styles we have been looking at. All classes have shown amazing creativity in their compositions and composed some excellent pieces of work. The year 5 group that composed their own Gumboot dancing was a particular highlight of mine and they enjoyed themselves immensely.

In art the year 5s are finishing their Aboriginal artworks. The children have worked very hard on these, keeping their paintings as authentic looking as possible. Year 6 are finishing their Futurism artworks. They have been thinking carefully about colour theory and choosing colour schemes that accentuate the movements of the human forms within them.

In technology, year 5 have been dying their t-shirts using their knowledge of Shibori, the ancient Japanese art of tie-dye. Year 6 have done a fantastic job with their slippers!

In history, year 5 have been working on their explorers again this week, with a particular focus on Ferdinand Magellan and his circumnavigation of the world. Scurvy got them particularly excited as they had just looked at what caused it in science. The fact that the sailors had to eat rats

and sawdust also brought home the hardships of such a voyage!

Year 6 meanwhile completed their Battle of Britain work and moved on to Hitler's invasion of Russia and the consequences of that attack for both nations.



Primrose Hill Summer Lectures 2019

Wednesday 26 June: Daniel Rosenthal on The Lives and Letters of the National Theatre

Daniel Rosenthal is an author and journalist whose definitive work of stage history, *The National Theatre Story* won the 2014 Theatre Book Prize. His new book *Dramatic Exchanges: The Lives and Letters of the National Theatre* is a magnificent collection of off-stage dramas drawn from the correspondence of some of our best-known theatrical stars, in conversation with friends - Jane Maud, Michael Frayn and Michael Blakemore - Daniel delves into the mores and motivations of directors, actors and actresses.

Wednesday 5 June: Gill Bennett on Spies, Lies and Disinformation

Gill Bennett OBE is a leading authority on secret intelligence in the UK. Formerly Chief Historian of the Foreign and Commonwealth Office and Senior Editor of the FCO's official history of post-war foreign policy, she has worked closely with twelve Foreign Secretaries under six Prime Ministers, from Edward Heath to Tony Blair. In a lecture informed by a lifetime's insider knowledge, Gill discusses current and historic espionage techniques and points out the resonance of a 1920s dirty tricks campaign to our own 'post-truth' society.

Wednesday 3 July: Nicci Gerrard on What Dementia Teaches us about Love

Nicci Gerrard is one of our most compelling writers on social justice. Her reporting in *The Observer* on the care and understanding of dementia patients in the UK won the 2016 Orwell Prize for Exposing Britain's Social Evils. *What Dementia Teaches Us About Love* was written after the death of her father, an Alzheimer's sufferer, and is an exceptional study of ageing and identity, illuminated by in-depth research and personal experience. Nicci's lecture asks us what it truly means to care. How can we learn to value the old and invisible among us? What, at the end of a life, really matters?

Wednesday 12 June: Andrew Marr on Democracy: Is Politics Broken?

Andrew Marr is one of our best-known political commentators. Formerly editor of *The Independent*, he was, from 2000-2005, Political Editor of the BBC. He continues to present BBC's flagship current affairs programme *The Andrew Marr Show* and Radio 4's *Start the Week*. A Primrose Hill local, long-standing friend of St Mary's and now patron of our youth work, Andrew returns with a timely lecture on the fragility of parliamentary democracy. If British politics is indeed broken, what can we do to mend it?

Wednesday 10 July: David Nott on War Doctor - Surgery on the Front Line

David Nott is widely acknowledged as the world's most experienced trauma surgeon. Over the last 25 years, he has saved lives in Afghanistan, Bosnia, Chad, Darfur, Gaza, Iraq, Libya, Sierra Leone, and opposition-held East Aleppo. Known in the field as the 'Indiana Jones of surgery', he was honoured with an OBE in 2012 and the Robert Burns Humanitarian Award in 2016. David's best-selling autobiography *War Doctor - Surgery on the Front Line* recounts his extraordinary career working with Médecins Sans Frontières, the Red Cross and the Royal Auxiliary Air Force. His lecture, with its first-hand account of courage and compassion on the front line, is set to be equally inspiring.

Wednesday 19 June: Isabella Tree on Wilding - The Return of Nature to a British Farm

Isabella Tree is an award-winning author, travel writer and environmentalist. In the course of her career, she has made an eloquent study of disappearing worlds in Papua New Guinea (*Islands in the Clouds*, 1996), Mexico (*Sliced Iguana*, 2001) and Nepal (*The Living Goddess*, 2014). Her latest book *Wilding - the Return of Nature to a British Farm* tells the no less urgent story of our own countryside under threat from intensive farming. In this thought-provoking lecture, Isabella argues that it is possible to feed an overcrowded planet while leaving space for the wild, and shows how quickly a 'hands off' approach can restore land and wildlife.


