The topic theme of 'Change' weaves its way through the Reception curriculum this term and what better way to illustrate this than by making bread. This week has been an exciting one for year 3. They have travelled back in time and experienced what life was like in Ancient Egypt. They all looked great in their costumes and enjoyed creating an Egyptian dance. The children have been learning about the



importance of the River Nile and they have started to write an Egyptian adventure in English. Keeping with the Egyptian theme, the children have been drawing their name in hieroglyphics in art. In maths, we have been looking at converting money from pounds to pence, adding two amounts of money and subtracting amounts of money.

In English this week, the Year 4 children completed their biography written work about Neil Armstrong, Muhammed Ali or Stephen Hawking. This topic and their subjects really caught the children's interest, which was reflected in the quality of the writing they produced. Consolidation and challenges centred around fractions, decimals, ordering and rounding decimals was the focus in maths. In science, the children investigated wonderful



water, and the processes of melting, freezing, condensing and evaporating. This included several investigations including adding salt to ice, observing, then trying to explain what happened. Anglo Saxon kings were the focus in topic; who was best - King Alfred the Great or King Athelstan? Please debate, and they did!

In RS, year 6 have been exploring the parable of the Tower of Babel. In teams of eight and armed with 18 wooden blocks, teams competed to build the tallest tower...with a twist. Just like the Babylonians, teams were not able to communicate! Half the team could only whistle,



and the other half could only hum. The results were certainly interesting! Afterwards, pupils had a mature and articulate whole class discussion on the challenges God made the people and their descendants face as a result of their hubris and conceit.

In History, year 6 children have now completed their letters home from the trenches and have been looking at the Christmas Truce of 1914 where enemies met in no-man's land, exchanged

gifts and even played football. We then discussed why it was never repeated. A diary entry was then written to remind themselves of what happened. In year 5, we looked at the long term causes of the English Civil War and how the struggle between King and Parliament slowly developed. These were then recorded in preparation for the short term causes next week.

In year 5 Reading, we have finished reading Klaus Vokal and the Bad Lads by David Almond. After discussing the themes and morals in the story, including standing up to bullies and being yourself, we have started to create our own posters for our form rooms, sharing inspirational quotes and advice.

And we saw plenty of evidence of this at the weekend!

Learning how to plan, shop for and cook a meal for four people with a budget of only £5 really did test their skills of resourcefulness, initiative and collaboration. Our year 7 children certainly know how far £5 can stretch at Asda, if you shop sensibly (and remove avocados from your shopping list!). We were very impressed with how well the teams had researched their recipes, organised the equipment they needed, and stuck to the time limits. The learning didn't stop there: clearing away and washing up was all part of the

experience!

Many of our year 7 group had not boarded before, so it was a brilliant opportunity for them to see what a night in boarding is like. After clearing up, the boys enjoyed puzzles, board games and some basketball and dodgeball in the Sports Hall, followed by milk and biscuits in the GrubHub before bed. The next morning involved getting their breakfast ready, bed-making and some shoe-polishing: life-skills we are confident that will be remembered for a while yet!

ordered by their departments. This means that current pupils are already seeing the benefit of this fundraising initiative.


